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this pathbreaking work uncovers new translations of the main myths and epics written in akkadian including the creation myths and the epic of gilgamesh the deities and heroes which figure in these stories are all of ancient mesopotamia and many of the original clay tablets on which the stories were first inscribed were discovered there a striking collection of accurate and up to date renderings of the best preserved cuneiform texts in current readable english and discoveries of both new tablets and points of grammar and lexicography during the last twenty five years these translations will inevitably replace all previous versions the book provides introductions to each item giving insight into the sources and datings of the texts notes to guide the reader through difficulties an up to date glossary of deities place names and key terms a chronological chart and map and illustrations of some of the mythical monsters that are mentioned in the stories

influence from mesopotamia on adjacent civilizations has often been proposed on the basis of scattered similarities for the first time a wide ranging assessment from 3000 bc to the middle ages investigates how similarities arose in egypt palestine anatolia and greece the development of writing for accountancy astronomy divination and belles lettres emanated from mesopotamians who took their academic traditions into countries beyond their political control each country soon transformed what it received into its own individual culture when cuneiform writing disappeared babylonian cults and literature now in aramaic and greek flourished during the roman empire the manichaeans adapted the old traditions which then perished under persecution but traces persist in hermetic works court narratives and romances and in the arabian nights when ancient mesopotamia was rediscovered in the last century british scholars were at the forefront of international research public excitement has been reflected in pictures and poems films and fashion

this book attempts to re think the purpose of the great pyramid of the giza plateau which are commonly thought to be the tombs of pharaohs the first part examines the great pyramid s architectural features construction details and internal structure referencing experts and historical figures such as professor wm flinders petrie colonel howard vyse piazzzi smyth herodotus irving finkel brothers john and morton edgar jimmy dunn giovanni battista caviglia giovanni battista belzoni and many others this portion of the book closely examines peculiarities of the internal floorplan of the great pyramid and signs of destruction found in its internal rooms and passageways in the second part of the book the author attempts to re interpret ancient sumerian scripts and unexpectedly finds sumerian names for the apartments and the passageways of the great pyramid including descriptions and dimensions which have not yet been noted in any historical document the sumerian chronicles contain not only a description of the events that caused destruction inside the great pyramid traces of which were discovered by modern researchers and described in the first part of the book but also the process of building the great pyramid itself the author finds

symbols of the internal structure of the great pyramid reflected in other archaeological artifacts such as the greenstone seal of adda additionally he finds details in the description of the hanging gardens of babylon considering the construction and functionality of the grand gallery he discovers an unexpected relationship between the great pyramid and its chambers and the images of egyptian gods such as isis serapis geb nut nephtys and others the book presents the reader with an entirely new understanding of images of the ancient gods which symbolically describe the functionality of the great pyramid it also highlights the great pyramid's central role in the development of human civilization although this book uses technical terms and references ancient sumerian texts it is written in order to be accessible to the common reader

this engaging and informative introduction to the the babylonians were important not only because of their many historical contacts with ancient israel but because they and their predecessors the sumerians established the philosophical and social infrastructure for most of western asia for nearly two millennia beginning and advanced students as well as biblical scholars and interested nonspecialists will read this introduction to the history and culture of the babylonians with interest and profit

discusses the significance behind each myth and compares it to modern day quests and journeys

examining the evolution of kingship in the ancient near east from the time of the sumerians to the rise of the seleucids in babylon this book argues that the sumerian emphasis on the divine favour that the fertility goddess and the sun god bestowed upon the king should be understood metaphorically from the start and that these metaphors survived in later historical periods through popular literature including the epic of gilgamesh and the enuma elish the author's research shows that from the earliest times near eastern kings and their scribes adapted these metaphors to promote royal legitimacy in accordance with legendary exempla that highlighted the role of the king as the establisher of order and civilization as another gilgamesh and later as a pious servant of marduk the king renewed divine favour for his subjects enabling them to share the garden of the gods seleucus and antiochus found these cultural ideas as they had evolved in the first millennium bce extremely useful in their efforts to establish their dynasty at babylon far from playing down cultural differences the book considers the ideological agendas of ancient near eastern empires as having been shaped mainly by class rather than race minded elites

this is the first systematic attempt to survey in detail the archaeological evidence for the crafts and craftsmanship of the sumerians babylonians and assyrians in ancient mesopotamia covering the period c 8000 300 bc as creators of some of the earliest farming and urban communities known to us these people were among the first pioneers of many crafts and skills that remain fundamental to modern ways of

life many of the raw materials for crafts had to be imported from outside the river valley of the tigris and euphrates providing an unusually sensitive indicator of the commercial and cultural contacts of mesopotamia in this book dr moorey reviews briefly the textual evidence and then goes on to examine in detail the material evidence for a wide range of crafts using stones both common and ornamental animal products from hippopotamus ivory to ostrich egg shells ceramics glazed materials and glass metals and building materials with a comprehensive bibliography this will be a key work of reference for archaeologists and those interested in the early history of crafts and technology as well as for specialist historians of the ancient near east
