

# The Daodejing Of Laozi

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a daoist classic that has had a profound influence on chinese thought the laozi or daodejing evolved into its present form sometime around the third century bce and continues to enjoy great popularity throughout east asia and beyond philip j ivanhoe's lucid and philosophically minded interpretation and commentary offer fresh insights into this classic work in the substantial introduction and numerous notes ivanhoe draws attention to the issues at play in the text often relating them to contemporary philosophical discussions and directing the reader to related passages within the daodejing and to other works of the period the

language appendix unique to this edition offers eight translations of the opening passage by well known and influential scholars and explains line by line how each might have reached his particular interpretation

this translation presents daoism s basic text in highly readable contemporary english incorporating the latest scholarship in the field including the most recent discoveries of ancient manuscripts in the 1970s and 90s the book explains daodejing s often cryptic verses in a clear and concise way the introduction interprets the daodejing s poetic imagery in the context of ancient chinese symbolism and a brief philosophical analysis accompanies each of the 81 translated chapters of the daodejing

laozi also lao tzu [lɑʊˈdz] or lao tze chinese [lɑʊˈz] pinyin [lɑʊˈz] literally old master was an ancient chinese philosopher and writer he is known as the reputed author of the tao te ching the founder of philosophical taoism and a deity in religious taoism and traditional chinese religions a semi legendary figure laozi is usually dated to around the 6th century bce and reckoned a

contemporary of Confucius but some historians contend that he actually lived during the Warring States period of the 5th or 4th century BCE. A central figure in Chinese culture, Laozi is claimed by both the emperors of the Tang dynasty and modern people of the Li surname as a founder of their lineage. Laozi's work has been embraced by various anti-authoritarian movements, as well as Chinese legalism. The *Tao Te Ching* is a classic Chinese text written around the 6th century BCE by Laozi, a Zhou dynasty courtier. While its authorship is debated, the text remains a fundamental building block of Taoism and one of the most influential works of its time. Today, it is one of the most translated works in the world. The work itself is a series of 81 short poetic sections, each one written in a fluid, ambiguous style, leaving them open to wide interpretation. Subjects range from advice to those in power to advice to regular people and adages for daily living. Because of its ambiguous nature, the *Tao Te Ching* is famously difficult to translate, and many, if not all, translations are significantly influenced by the translator's state of mind. This translation is by James Legge, a famous Scottish sinologist and the first professor of Chinese at Oxford University. Traditionally attributed to Lao Tzu, an older contemporary of Confucius (551-479 BCE), it is now thought that the work was compiled in about the fourth century BCE. An anthology of wise sayings, it offers a model by which the individual can live rather than explaining the human place in the universe. The moral code it encourages is based on modesty and self-restraint, and the rewards reaped for such a life are harmony and flow of life.

2,500 years ago a little-known government official in China wrote a book that has been translated more often than any other book in the world except the Bible. This book, the *Daodejing* (pronounced *dow de jing*) and often referred to as just the *Dao*, is the basis of much of the Eastern world's philosophical and religious thought, as well as Tai Chi and Kung Fu. It contains wisdom that pertains to daily life as well as the administration of government, but it is an entertaining one-night read. I'll bet you can't read it without smiling. tao te ching also commonly known as lao tzu is perhaps the most important of chinese classical texts with an unparalleled influence on chinese thought this bilingual edition consists of two parts the english text in part one is a reprint of the earlier translation of the so called wang pi text first published by penguin books in 1963 part two is the fresh translation of a text which is a conflation of two manuscripts of the lao tzu dating at the latest from the early western han and discovered at ma wang tui in december 1973 the result is a text with a fuller use of particles free from the scribal errors and editorial tampering of subsequent ages

as one of the greatest masterpieces in chinese history dao de jing is a philosophical work by laozi li er c 571 471 bce published in the 4th century bce it contains 81 chapters verses whose essence is on moral philosophy and ideal ways for humans to be in

harmony with nature self cultivation governing the country deploying military forces among other things although some of the ideas are only historically relevant at the time when laozi lived most of his thoughts are still pertinent today because human nature has not drastically changed since antiquity and many social ills that laozi mentioned still exist like the christian bible dao de jing is one of the most translated works in world literature this bilingual edition with full chinese texts and pinyin pronunciation has attempted to adhere as faithfully as possible to the original meanings in the chinese texts and to reflect recent revisionary development in daoist scholarship hence the chinese character for the way is rendered dao rather than tao dao de jing in place of tao te ching and laozi for lao tzu discarding the older wade giles system for transcribing chinese words this translation aims to assist western readers to learn the chinese language while they attempt to better understand the deeper meanings of these philosophical ideas

the daodejing tao te ching was originally compiled over 2500 years ago in what is now northwestern central china this new translation of laozi s daodejing attempts to present a fairly literal rendering of the short ancient classical chinese text the version of the daodejing used here is the standard received text included in the young scholar wang bi s third century commentary the entire classical chinese text is presented line by line from right to left on pages facing the lines of english translation this translation differs from the dozens of previous translations and hundreds of adaptations of the daodejing in that it doesn t project later cultural or religious beliefs back onto the text it doesn t omit or add words in order to ignore or explain away those portions of the text that don t reflect a modern enlightened worldview instead footnotes are provided where necessary to explain how the book s 81 poems reflect the ancient customs and religious practices of ancient china during what is known as the warring states period all of the book s poems are concerned with the mystical life force laozi calls the way or a related resonating personal force he calls virtue the poems have an intimate knowing tone to them and touch on many of the concerns of laozi s day there are myriad universal deities to be honored and spirits in nature to be considered there are the friendly spirits

of ancestors to be cared for and the unfriendly ghosts of ancestors to be avoided there are farmers craftsman soldiers and aristocrats to be dealt with and robbers madmen and itinerant philosophers to be on the alert for there are treaties to be made and battles to be fought laozi good naturedly instructs the reader on how the way gives rise to heaven earth mankind and the ten thousand things through the poems he attempts to describe the indescribable the way s mysterious action without action and its effect on those who trust in it enough to let it guide their lives
