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this book uses data collected from in depth interviews with young people over the course of a year to explore the complex role of social media in their lives and the part it plays in shaping how they understand and present their identity to a broad public on a wide array of platforms using this data the book proposes and develops a new theoretical framework for understanding identity performances comic theory detailed in this book centres on a consideration of the role of social media design in shaping identity and explores the ways in which socio culturally grounded users engage in acts of compromise novelty and negotiation with social media designs and digital technologies to produce unique identity performances positioned within the field of educational research this book overtly challenges assumptions and myths about the internet as a neutral source of knowledge instead exploring the way in which designs and technologies shape who we interact with and how we understand what it is to be social moving beyond the over used digital natives paradigm this book makes a clear case that educators and education

researchers need to move beyond a focus on coding and digital skills alone highlighting the pressing need to take explicit account of the overlaps between digital technology culture and education

this paper examines how national identity affects day to day economic behavior we exploit the brexit referendum as a shock to the salience of identity and measure its impact on consumer choices in the uk between british and eu grocery products drawing from a unique panel dataset with 12 million shoppers we find that the referendum is associated with an increase in consumption of uk products 6 and a reduction in demand for eu products 13 changes in consumption are driven by identity being top of mind consumption of uk products is up to 7 higher during intense media discussions on brexit particularly during discussions on the politics of regaining sovereignty relative to the economic or social issues associated with brexit these findings underscore the importance of national identity in shaping routine economic decisions and the mediating role that political events and the media can play by keeping identity top of mind

over one billion people access the internet worldwide and new problems of language security and culture accompany this access to foster productive and effective communication it becomes imperative to understand people s different linguistic and cultural backgrounds as well as their value systems reconceptualizing new media and intercultural communication in a networked society is a critical scholarly resource that addresses the need for understanding the complex connections between culture
