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this book provides the latest research in ethnic and cultural identity the first chapter examines the relationship between ethnic identity culture body dissatisfaction and related disorder eating behaviors among diverse ethnic groups of adolescent and young female adults the second chapter discusses migrants perceptions of intergroup relations and ethnic group statue in the host society the third chapter provides an overview of research on perceived discrimination which is considered the most severe stressor for minority individuals given its persuasive impact on health and well being the fourth and fifth chapters include discussions on the relationship between openness to experience ethnocentrism and ethnic prejudice and

the effects of language policy on ethnic minority language maintenance among a relatively newer community in manchester the sixth chapter examines how social gendered and economic forces have changed the ways in which family systems create and sustain a familial identity the second half of the book includes a narrative analysis to explore how a sample of muslim identified women attributed meaning to the practice of veiling and the contexts by which women decided to or not to wear the hijab a summary of the results of a qualitative study exploring the influence of discrimination on identity negotiation in transracial international adoptees provides a review of established health risks to latino identifying persons in the united states and successful interventions with various samples deconstructs the latin lover stereotype and finally maps racial neoliberalism in u s popular culture

as the twentieth century closes ethnicity stands out as a powerful force for binding people together in a sense of shared origins and worldview but this emphasis on a people s uniqueness can also develop into a distorted rationale for insularity inter ethnic animosity or as we have seen in this century armed conflict ethnic identity clearly holds very real consequences for individuals and peoples yet there is not much agreement on what exactly it is or how it is formed the growing recognition that ethnicity is not fixed and inherent but elastic and constructed fuels the essays in this collection regarding identity as a dynamic on going formative and transformative process we are a people considers narrative the creation and maintenance of a common story as the keystone in building a sense of peoplehood myths of origin triumph over adversity migration and so forth chart a group s history while continual additions to the larger narrative stress moving into the future as a people still there is more to our stories as individuals and groups most of us are aware that we take on different roles and project different aspects of ourselves depending on the situation some individuals who have inherited multiple group affiliations from their families view themselves not as this or that but all at once so too with ethnic groups the so called hyphenated americans are not the only people in the world to recognize or embrace their plurality this relatively recent acknowledgment of multiplicity has potentially wide implications destabilizing the limited and limiting categories inscribed in for example public policy and discourse on race relations we are a people is a path breaking volume boldly illustrating how ethnic identity works in the real world author note paul spickard is professor and chair of asian american studies at uc santa barbara and is author of mixed blood w jeffrey burroughs is professor of psychology at brigham young university hawaii

in contrast to other disciplines social psychology has been slow in responding to the questions posed by the issue of ethnicity the social psychology of ethnic identity second edition demonstrates the important and diverse contribution that social psychology can make comprehensively updated to include the latest research on dual and multiple identities mutual links

between sense of ethnic identity and social contexts and the development of ethnic identity in adolescence this new edition now also features research from non european cultural contexts including turkey mauritius and myanmar the book shows on the one hand that social psychology can be used to develop a better understanding of ethnicity and on the other hand that increased attention to ethnicity can benefit social psychology by filling in theoretical and empirical gaps maykel verkuyten brings an original approach to subjects such as ethnic minority identity place space and time hyphenated identities and duality and self descriptions and the ethnic self featuring the latest theoretical ideas and research the combination of diverse approaches to this burgeoning field make this book invaluable reading for students of psychology and related disciplines as well as researchers and professionals

this book combines history sociology psychology and educational policy in research on a 40 year crucial phase of development of ethnic identity ethnic relations and educational and social policies for children in england from pre school to secondary school the authors show how nursery children of different ethnicities interact in beginning their identity journeys in a culture of both inequality and evolving ethnic relationships and patterns of harmony in britain s developing multicultural society in looking at self concept development in secondary school children through the lens of various kinds of child maltreatment alicia sawyerr and christopher bagley argue that ethnic minority children are psychological survivors and african caribbean girls especially are making strong identity steps it is the poor whites who will make up the precariat the reserve army of labour who are left behind in structures of inequality

choosing ethnic identity explores the ways in which people are able to choose their ethnic identities in contemporary multiethnic societies such as the usa and britain notions such as adopting an identity or self designated terms such as black british and asian american suggest the importance of agency and choice for individuals however the actual range of ethnic identities available to individuals and the groups to which they belong are not wholly under their control these identities must be negotiated in relation to both the wider society and coethnics the ability of minority individuals and groups to assert or recreate their own self images and ethnic identities against the backdrop of ethnic and racial labelling by the wider society is important for their self esteem and social status this book examines the ways in which ethnic minority groups and individuals are able to assert and negotiate ethnic identities of their choosing and the constraints structuring such choices by drawing on studies from both the usa and britain miri song concludes that while significant constraints surround the exercising of ethnic options there are numerous ways in which ethnic minority individuals and groups contest and assert particular meanings and representations associated with their ethnic identities

since the ethnic revival of the last twenty years there has been a substantial and interdisciplinary change in our understanding of the link between these fundamental aspects of our identity

examines the shifting meanings of race and ethnicity and the essential concepts from marxist views to post colonialism this book investigates the attendant debates issues and analyses within the context of global change it uses international case studies to explain the difficult elements of theory and focuses on everyday life issues

the relationship between ethnic identity and power has important consequences in a modern world that is changing rapidly through global immigration trends studies of ethnic racial conflict of ethnic identity and power become necessarily studies of political power social status school achievement and allocation of resources the recognition of power by an ethnic group however creates a competition for control and a rivalry for power over public arenas such as schools in this context this book provides interesting and important insights into the dilemmas faced by immigrants and members of ethnic groups by school personnel and by policy makers the first part of the book consists of comparative studies of ethnic identity the second part focuses directly on some of the lessons learned from social science research on ethnic identification and the critical study of equity with its implications for pedagogy an interdisciplinary group of scholars offers profoundly honest and stimulating accounts of their struggles to decipher self identification processes in various political contexts as well as their personal reflections on the study of ethnicity a powerful message emerges that invites reflection about self identification processes and that allows a deeper understanding of the empowering consequences of a clear and strong personal cultural ethnic and social identity these pages offer a keen grasp of the undeniable political contexts of education

state schooling and ethnic identity examines the influence of state schooling on tibetan students ethnic identity zhiyong zhu has developed a case study of changzhou tibetan middle school after a preferential educational policy was put in place by the chinese government in the early 1980s by examining and analyzing student diaries zhu has developed a theoretical model for the construction of ethnic identity

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
