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murray edelman holds a unique and distinguished position in american political science for decades one of the few serious scholars to question dominant rational choice interpretations of politics edelman looked instead to the powerful influence of signs spectacles and symbols of culture on political behavior and political institutions his first now classic book the symbolic uses of politics created paths of inquiry in political science communication studies and sociology that are still being explored today in this book edelman continues his quest to understand the influence of perception on the political process by turning to the role of art he argues that political ideas language and actions cannot help but be based upon the images and narratives we take from literature paintings film television and other genres edelman believes art provides us with models scenarios narratives and images we draw upon in order to make sense of political events and he explores the different ways art can shape political perceptions and actions to both promote and inhibit diversity and democracy elegantly written he brilliantly contends that art helps create the images from which opinion molders and citizens construct the social realities of politics choice it is perhaps the freshness with which he puts his case that is what makes from art to politics as well as his other works so challenging and invigorating philip abbott review of politics

those embracing it but seeking a means to elaborate the significance that it can make in the world the routledge companion to art and politics brings together a range of issues and approaches and encourages critical and creative thinking about how art is produced perceived and received

a major issue in the relation of art to the rest of society is the question of how art penetrates politics from the perspective of most art scholars this is a question of aesthetics whether politics necessarily pollutes and debases the quality of the arts from the perspective of social science it has been primarily a question of

meaning how political messages are conveyed through artistic media recent work has begun to broaden the study of the arts and politics beyond semiosis and content focus several strands of scholarship are converging around the general issue of the social relationships within which art takes political form that is how art and artists do politics this perspective of doing moves analysis beyond addressing the meaning of culture to focus on the ways that art is embedded in and intervenes in social relationships activities and institutions this volume brings together an interdisciplinary group of scholars from france and the united states to investigate these directions and themes by exploring the question of how to do politics with art from a comparative standpoint putting sociological approaches in conversation with other disciplinary prisms it will be of interest to scholars of social movements and politicization the sociology of art art history and aesthetics

americans enjoy the most benevolent political system that has ever emerged in the course of human history unprecedented prosperity health liberty and stability give rise to the envy of the rest of the world however these privileges cannot defend themselves the art of politics necessitates that we balance the conflicting claims of these and other political goods in the midst of ever changing circumstances and external and internal threats reason pluralism necessary limits liberty toleration justice the right to private property democracy authority and civility are the goods the enemies are the ideologues who scorn this system because it falls short of a never realized theoretical ideal they have borrowed from their european brethren this effort by the ideologues to change our systems radically is ultimately the betrayal of american politics and one of the most serious threats we face this book tells us how to defend ourselves against these threats and how to practice this most valuable art the art of politics book jacket

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visual art has a ubiquitous political cast today but which politics daniel herwitz seeks clarity on the various things meant by politics and how we can evaluate their presumptions or aspirations in contemporary art drawing on the work of william kentridge drenched in violence race and power and the artworld immolations of banksy herwitz's examples range from the nea 4 and the question of offense as dissent to the community driven work of george gittoes the identity politics of contemporary american art and for contrast with the power of visual media literature written in dialogue with truth commissions he is interested in understanding art practices today in the light of two opposing inheritances the avant gardes and their politicization of the experimental art object and 18th century aesthetics preaching the autonomy of the art object which he interprets as the cultural compliment to modern liberalism his historically informed approach reveals how crucial this pair of legacies is to reading the tensions in voice and character of art today driven by questions about the capacity of the visual medium to speak politically

or acquire political agency this book is for anyone working in aesthetics or the art world concerned with the fate of cultural politics in a world spinning out of control yet within reach of emancipation

this volume presents a keystone collection that pursues new frameworks for a critical understanding of the relationship between public art and protest movements through the utilization of socially engaged and choreopolitical approaches this anthology draws from a unique combination of interdisciplinary scholarship and activism where it integrates geographically rich perspectives from political and grassroots community contexts spanning the us europe australia and southeastern africa the volume questions and re imagines not only how public art practice can be integral to politics including forms of surveillance and control of bodily movement it also probes into how political participation itself can be construed as a form of public artmaking for radical social change and just worlds this collection advocates for scholar activist inquiry into how socially engaged public art practices can choreograph greater intersectional justice and pave the way for thinking through and working towards more inclusive futures this book provides a wide appeal to audiences across humanities and social science scholarship arts practice and activism seeking conceptual and empirically informed tools for moving from public art and choreopolitical theory into modes of praxis critical reflection and action

the olympics have a checkered sometimes scandalous political history jules boykoff a former us olympic team member takes readers from the event s nineteenth century origins through the games flirtation with fascism and into the contemporary era of corporate control along the way he recounts vibrant alt olympic movements such as the workers games and women s games of the 1920s and 1930s as well as athlete activists and political movements that stood up to challenge the olympic machine

this book offers an analysis of paz s political thought arguing that it is rooted in two separate and often antagonistic traditions liberalism and romanticism grenier shows that paz s political thought is best approached not so much by looking at the specific positions paz took in the issues of his day but rather by uncovering the core values at the heart of paz s political philosophy from art to politics gives not only a better understanding of paz s thought but also a discussion of the political culture and democratization of mexico the book takes a novel look at issues such as the relations between art and politics the role of intellectuals and the penchant of academics for machination theories in the area of art and culture the result is an account of paz s work that is both more focused and more ambitious than those offered in previous books on paz s politics

this book analyzes the relationship between art and politics in two contrasting modern dictatorships through a detailed look at the chilean and romanian dictatorships it compares the different ways in which political regimes convey their view of the world through artistic means it examines how artists help convey a new understanding of politics and political action during repressive regimes that are inspired by either communism or anti communism neoliberalism traditionalist

conservative this book demonstrates how artistic renderings of life during dictatorships are similar in more than one respect and how art can help better grasp the similarities of these regimes it reveals how dictatorships use art to symbolically construct their power which artists can consolidate by lending their support or deconstruct through different forms of artistic resistance

riker uses game theory to illustrate political strategy in twelve stories from history and current events including lincoln s outmaneuvering of douglas in their debates and the parliamentary trick which defeated the equal rights amendment in the 1980 virginia senate vote
