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the papers in this volume approach the study of arabic its structure and use from different linguistic and sociolinguistic perspectives the book is divided into three sections section i morphological and phonological perspectives section ii semantic perspectives section iii sociolinguistic perspectives

a comprehensive introduction to the linguistic fundamentals of modern arabic ideal for arabic language learners as well as speakers interested in developing a richer understanding of language use and behavior introduction to arabic linguistics presents a clear and engaging overview of the core linguistic aspects of modern arabic

focusing on modern standard arabic and levantine arabic designed to be welcoming for undergraduates without fluency in arabic and for students with only limited familiarity with linguistics this textbook covers all fundamental areas of arabic linguistics detailed yet accessible chapters include comprehension and analysis questions critical thinking exercises application examples with authentic data reading assignments and classroom and homework projects this valuable textbook is organized into three units which cover sounds and sound systems word structure and meaning and phrases and phrase structure author youssef haddad draws from both the arabic grammatical tradition and recent linguistic research to provide students with a solid foundation in the linguistic features and structures of arabic sounds words and phrases topics include phonological processes derivational morphology noun and verb phrases sentence structure structural ambiguity and more discusses key topics in the formal study of arabic linguistics suitable for arabic speakers and language learners encourages students to investigate a dialect not covered in the book at different levels of linguistic analysis answers many of the most common and relevant questions in the field of arabic linguistics includes a typological and historical overview of the arabic language offers an instructor s website with additional exercises practice questions powerpoint presentations and answer keys introduction to arabic linguistics is the perfect textbook for undergraduates in modern language and linguistic courses and a valuable resource for graduate students in arabic studies or linguistics programs

the papers in this collection derive from the annual symposia on arabic linguistics held in stanford 1999 and berkeley 2000 the selection is noteworthy for its diversity of approach and for a noticeable broadening of the kinds of questions that are being asked and the kind of data being gathered about arabic in various settings these papers cover many aspects of arabic linguistic research from models of language acquisition to the borrowing of discourse patterns and the use of secret languages

this volume divides into 3 sections i arabic in contact the hispano arabic connection ii arabic in contact other connections iii phonological perspectives

arabic is one of the world's largest languages spoken natively by nearly 300 million people by strength of numbers alone arabic is one of our most important languages studied by scholars across many different academic fields and cultural settings it is however a complex language rooted in its own tradition of scholarship constituted of varieties each imbued with unique cultural values and characteristic linguistic properties understanding its linguistics holistically is therefore a challenge the oxford handbook of arabic linguistics is a comprehensive one volume guide that deals with all major research domains which have been developed within arabic linguistics chapters are written by leading experts in the field who both present state of the art overviews and develop their own critical perspectives the handbook begins with arabic in its semitic setting and ends with the modern dialects it ranges across the traditional the classical arabic grammatical and lexicographical traditions to the contemporary arabic sociolinguistics creole varieties and codeswitching psycholinguistics and arabic as a second language while situating arabic within current phonetic phonological morphological syntactic and lexicological theory an essential reference work for anyone working within arabic linguistics the book brings together different approaches and scholarly traditions and provides analysis of current trends and directions for future research

this volume provides a general perspective on aspects of arabic in relation to various areas of linguistics to the general linguist it is a source of information and data on arabic analyzed within current models of analysis to the arabic linguist it provides current analyses of both familiar and new data the book is divided into three sections which contain exciting papers on arabic syntax mostly within government binding theory textual analysis and psycholinguistics the volume opens with an overview of the current state of arabic linguistics by the editor and a major presentation by charles ferguson

comprising ten papers from this symposium this volume deals with the syntax of arabic phonology and variation the topics presented include binding in arabic the analysis of negation and negative polarity items pronoun doubling in codeswitching and linguistic variation and language change

the papers in the first section of this volume variation in arabic deal with a wide range of topics the function of modern standard arabic msa vs dialect variation in political speeches patterns of variation in concord in cairene dialect the extent to which cairenes know msa and the scope of emphaticization in different dialects in the section on phonological perspectives there are papers dealing with emphasis spread and with gemination degemination antigemination in iraqi arabic the papers in the section on syntax all focused on msa and within a gb framework discuss aspects of arabic that are problematic for current hypotheses in linguistics and also more traditional issues such as word order and verbal vs nominal sentences the last two papers represent a historical comparative semitic perspective on the function of energetic suffixes and on the reconstruction of the early arabic sounds represented by siin and šiin

arabic one of the official languages of the united nations is spoken by more than half a billion people around the world and is of increasing importance in today's political and economic spheres the study of the arabic language has a long and rich history earliest grammatical accounts date from the 8th century and include full syntactic morphological and phonological analyses of the vernaculars and of classical arabic in recent years the academic study of arabic has become increasingly sophisticated and broad this state of the art volume presents the most recent research in arabic linguistics from a theoretical point of view including computational linguistics syntax semantics and historical linguistics it also covers sociolinguistics applied linguistics and discourse analysis by looking at issues such as gender urbanization and language ideology underlying themes include the changing and evolving attitudes of speakers of arabic and theoretical approaches to linguistic variation in the middle east

this volume provides a unique collection of studies representing diversity and innovation in arabic linguistics the volume includes several groundbreaking papers authored by leaders in the field organized around key aspects of arabic morphosyntax semantics phonology and sociolinguistics as well as language acquisition and neurolinguistics balancing depth and width of coverage the volume integrates a variety of papers associated with inherent dialectal and diglossic variation innovative questions data and approaches as well as innovative reexaminations of existing theoretical frameworks making a meaningful contribution to the understanding of arabic linguistic structure and human language representation processing throughout all papers the volume is intended to highlight the potential contribution of arabic linguistics and to endorse further contributions to the sparse knowledge of language representation and processing in arabic to further develop our understanding of innate linguistic knowledge it draws special attention to the potential contribution of studies of diversity in arabic dialects and between the two language varieties of

arabic for the broader study of human language

the papers in this volume are a selection from papers presented at the annual symposia on arabic linguistics held in 2003 alexandria and 2004 oklahoma they tackle a broad range of issues in current linguistic research particularly in the areas of phonology morphology lexicon sociolinguistics and l1 and l2 acquisition they are distinguished for the depth of coverage and the types of data considered

the papers in this volume deal with various topics in arabic linguistics most of the papers focus on new issues and introduce new empirical generalizations that haven't been studied before within the context of arabic linguistics the syntax and morphosyntax papers explore issues ranging from the nature of extraction strategies to various types of construct state representations and the proper analysis of the distribution of the nominal adjectival and verbal morphological features the computational linguistics papers focus on the challenge posed by the non concatenative nature of arabic morphology the authors illustrate how their programs can handle arabic morphology the papers in morpho phonology and historical linguistics deal with the development of the arabic complementizer system and the empirical and theoretical problems that arise in the context of hypocoristic formation in arabic the sociolinguistics papers take up the issues of sociolinguistic variation as they pertain to the phenomenon of diglossia and regional uses of the standard variety of arabic

this volume contains sixteen contributions from the fourth conference on the foundations of arabic linguistics genova 2016 all having to do with the development of

linguistic theory in the arabic grammatical tradition starting from sībawayhi s kitāb end of the 8th century c e and its continuing evolution in later grammarians up till the 14th century c e the scope of this volume includes the links between grammar and other disciplines such as lexicography and logic and the reception of arabic grammar in the persian and malay linguistic tradition
