

This Is Orson Welles

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filmmaker radio celebrity actor writer producer painter magician orson welles did it all this collection of fascinating and revealing conversations between welles and his longtime friend peter bogdanovich gives readers an intimate look at this truly renaissance man 82 black and white photos

a beautifully researched valuable study of one of america s most influential and mysterious artists what makes this book remarkable is welle s own contribution his comments opinions interviews cut in and out of the narrative with an almost cinematic force patricia bosworth

it is only in the editing studio that he possesses absolute control with scholarly erudition welles revels in the plays of shakespeare and discusses their adaptation to stage and screen he assesses rival directors and eminent actors offers penetrating analyses of citizen kane touch of evil chimes at midnight and the third man and declares that he never made a film that lacked an ethical point of view book jacket

a brilliant biography of the young orson welles from his prodigious childhood and youth his triumphs with the mercury theatre to the making of citizen kane vivid vastly entertaining this is the definitive welles biography

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some innovators are luminous shooting stars think pablo picasso albert einstein sylvia plath bob dylan steve jobs who make bold leaps early and suddenly then lose their creativity others are late bloomers paul cezanne charles darwin virginia woolf alfred hitchcock warren buffett who show little early promise but spend long periods doggedly pursuing distant goals and attain greatness in old age by analyzing the careers of scores of great innovators this book reveals systematic differences in the motivations and methods of these two types and their very different patterns of creativity over the life cycle the result is a new and deeper unified understanding of the sources of human creativity

george orson welles 1915 1985 is considered to be among the greatest and most influential filmmakers of all time at just twenty five years old he cowrote produced directed and starred in his academy award winning debut film citizen kane 1941 his innovative and distinctive directorial style nonlinear narratives unusual camera angles deep focus shots and long takes continues to be emulated by directors and cinematographers to this day the brilliant yet provocative welles won multiple grammys a golden globe and the greatest honor the directors guild of america bestowed the d w griffith award his final film the other side of the wind was released in 2018 33 years after his death in citizen welles a biography of orson welles author frank brady presents a comprehensive and complete picture of the artist and auteur painstakingly researched brady delves into welles s creative achievements from his critically acclaimed film citizen kane and controversial radio broadcast the war of the worlds 1938 to his starring turn on Broadway in shaw s heartbreak house for which he made the cover of time brady also explores other notable films including the magnificent ambersons 1942 touch of evil 1958 and chimes at midnight 1965 this all encompassing work also details the personal side of welles s life including his romances with rita hayworth and dolores del rio and the confounding tragedy of his final years presented is a captivating and compelling encapsulation of the revered and respected artist

on the evening of october 30 1938 radio listeners across the united states heard a startling report of a meteor strike in the new jersey countryside with sirens blaring in the background announcers in the field described mysterious creatures terrifying war machines and thick clouds of poison gas moving toward new york city as the invading force approached manhattan some listeners sat transfixed while others ran to alert neighbors or to call the police some even fled their homes but the hair raising broadcast was not a real news bulletin it was orson welles s adaptation of the h g wells classic the war of the worlds in broadcast hysteria a brad schwartz boldly retells the story of welles s famed radio play and its impact did it really spawn a wave of mass hysteria as the new york times reported schwartz is the first to examine the hundreds of letters sent to orson welles himself in the days after the broadcast and his findings challenge the conventional wisdom few listeners believed an actual attack was under way but even so schwartz shows that welles s broadcast became

a major scandal prompting a different kind of mass panic as americans debated the bewitching power of the radio and the country s vulnerability in a time of crisis when the debate was over american broadcasting had changed for good but not for the better as schwartz tells this story we observe how an atmosphere of natural disaster and impending war permitted broadcasters to create shared live national experiences for the first time we follow orson welles s rise to fame and watch his manic energy and artistic genius at work in the play s hurried yet innovative production and we trace the present day popularity of fake news back to its source in welles s show and its many imitators schwartz s original research gifted storytelling and thoughtful analysis make broadcast hysteria a groundbreaking new look at a crucial but little understood episode in american history

looks at the life of the motion picture director producer and actor exploring the myths that surround his life and how he he used these secrets about his life in his films

film and genocide brings together scholars of film and of genocide to discuss film representations both fictional and documentary of the holocaust the armenian genocide and genocides in chile australia rwanda and the united states since 1955 when alain resnais created his experimental documentary night and fog about the nazis mass killings of jews and other ostracized groups filmmakers have struggled with using this medium to tell such difficult stories to re create the sociopolitical contexts of genocide and to urge awareness and action among viewers this volume looks at such issues as realism versus fiction the challenge of depicting atrocities in a manner palatable to spectators and film distributors the holocaust film as a model for films about other genocides and the role of new technologies in disseminating films about genocide film and genocide also includes interviews with three film directors who discuss their experiences in working with deeply disturbing images and bringing hidden stories to life irek dobrowolski director of the portraitist 2005 a documentary about wilhelm brasse an auschwitz birkenau prisoner ordered to take more than 40 000 photos at the camp nick hughes director of 100 days 2005 a dramatic film about the rwandan mass killings and greg barker director of ghosts of rwanda 2004 a television documentary for frontline

this edition of a history of shakespeare on screen updates the chronology to 2003 with a new chapter on recent films

in richard barr the playwright s producer author david a crespy investigates the career of one of the theatre s most vivid luminaries from his work on the film and radio productions of orson welles to his triumphant and final production of stephen sondheim s sweeney todd the demon barber of fleet street explored in detail along the way are the producer s relationship with playwright edward albee whose major plays such as a zoo story and who s afraid of virginia woolf barr was the first to produce and his innovative productions of controversial works by playwrights like samuel beckett terrence mcnally and sam shepard crespy draws on barr s own writings on the theatre his personal papers and more than sixty interviews with theatre professionals to offer insight into a man whose

legacy to producers and playwrights resounds in the theatre world also included in the volume are a foreword and an afterword by Edward Albee a three time Pulitzer Prize winning playwright and one of Barr's closest associates

surveys the life and career of Orson Welles providing detailed information on his work in radio television theater and film key people in his life technical information and film theory

as garment workers longshoremen autoworkers sharecroppers and clerks took to the streets striking and organizing unions in the midst of the depression artists writers and filmmakers joined the insurgent social movement by creating a cultural front Disney cartoonists walked picket lines and Billie Holiday sang Strange Fruit at the Left Wing Cabaret Café Society Duke Ellington produced a radical musical jump for joy New York garment workers staged the legendary Broadway revue Pins and Needles and Orson Welles and his Mercury Players took their labor operas and anti fascist Shakespeare to Hollywood and made Citizen Kane a major reassessment of US cultural history the cultural front is a vivid mural of this extraordinary upheaval which reshaped American culture in the twentieth century

at twenty five Orson Welles 1915 1985 directed co wrote and starred in Citizen Kane widely considered the best film ever made but Welles was such a revolutionary filmmaker that he found himself at odds with the Hollywood studio system his work was so far ahead of its time that he never regained the wide popular following he had once enjoyed as a young actor director on the radio frustrated by Hollywood and falling victim to the postwar blacklist Welles departed for a long European exile but he kept making films functioning with the creative freedom of an independent filmmaker before that term became common and eventually preserving his independence by funding virtually all his own projects because he worked defiantly outside the system Welles has often been maligned as an errant genius who squandered his early promise film critic Joseph McBride who acted in Welles's legendary unfinished film The Other Side of the Wind provocatively challenges conventional wisdom about Welles's supposed creative decline McBride is the first author to provide a comprehensive examination of the films of Welles's artistically rich yet little known later period during the 1970s and 80s Welles was breaking new aesthetic ground experimenting as adventurously as he had throughout his career McBride's friendship and collaboration with Welles and his interviews with those who knew and worked with the director make whatever happened to Orson Welles a portrait of rare intimacy and insight reassessing Welles's final period in the context of his entire life and work McBride's revealing portrait of this great film artist will change the terms of how Orson Welles is regarded

Orson Welles offers a fascinating peek behind the mask looking at the ascertainable facts of his life his loves and his collaborations and examines the ways in which the Welles legend has been constructed by himself his friends and his enemies

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
